

Dear Friend.

I am pleased to announce that my Senate Bill 192, which will result in as much as 500 miles of California trout and steelhead waters being designated as catch and release fisheries by the year 2000, was signed into law by Governor Brown in September.

The bill requires our Department of Fish & Game to prepare a list every year of at least 25 miles of trout and steelhead stream and at least one trout lake that it determines are suitable to become catch and release fisheries. The Department will make recommendations for these waters to be regulated as zero-limit, one-trout-limit, and two-trout-limit, combined with minimum or maximum size restrictions. Highest priority will be given toward designation of waters as zero-limit fisheries.

This list is to be submitted to the California Fish & Game Commission for consideration at its annual public hearings on fishery regulations. The Commission has authority to accept or reject the Department's catch and release recommendations and can remove or change regulations for any stream or lake in the program. To ensure that the program is fully carried out, the bill requires the Commission to state reasons why any stream or lake listed by the Department as suitable for consideration as a catch and release fishery was or was not included in the program in an annual report to the State Legislature.

Senate Fill 192 also requires the Department of Fish & Game to do complete biological studies and prepare fishery management recommendations for every trout or steelhead stream and lake in the state. As this is a monumental task, the bill directs the Department to give priority in its management planning effort to waters that are heavily fished, threatened with adverse environmental impacts, have the potential for producing large trout, or which contain rare species.



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These management plans will provide a systematic approach for the restoration of trout fisheries by compiling necessary scientific information on the potential of the fishery and determining the most suitable angling regulation for each stream or lake, including reductions in the trout limit where necessary to bring each water to its full capacity as a fishery. The Department must also determine whether each water should be managed as a wild trout or steelhead fishery or if

Senate Bill 192 specifically provides that the Department establish an ongoing program to determine the viability of various forms of catch and release regulations by scientific means. This scientific information is crucial to both the catch and release program and any changes in trout limit occuring on streams and lakes covered by management plans. It is my hope that this information will eventually result in changes in the general trout limit throughout the state.

I would like to thank the many clubs and individuals who have written me in support of this legislation. I would also like to thank Cal Trout, Federation of Fly Fishermen, Northern California Council of Fly Fishing Clubs, Trout Unlimited, American League of Anglers, California Wildlife Federation, and other organizations, whose support was instrumental in the passage of Senate Bill 192.

Without a doubt, one of the most worthless items I have ever seen. If ever there was anything designed to catch fisherman instead of heiring to catch fish, then this is surely that item.

The idea behind this gimmick is that you now no longer have to the knots from the leader to the fly, just one knot to this goodle and you can mearly snap, snap, flies onto your leader, change flies, all that good garbage.

So you say to yourself, "Hey that sounds great, no more loss of leader from changing flies, why my tippet will stay just at the right length." So fools that we are, we buy it and try it and cry foul!

The only time this thing works right is right at first, after you have arrived. assembled the rod and snap the first fly on. POP, gee that worked great you think, this is really something! Of course the fact that your hands are still warm and dry doesn't enter into your mind at all. Trout; The two best places I would recommend for this time of the year would be Pyramid and Baum Lakes.

ATTENTION COUNCIL CLUBS AND MEMBERS

We have been advised that the Department of Fish and Game is proposing to conduct massive budgets cuts of 30% for the proposed 1980-81 budget, in the event Jarvis II (Jaws II) is passed by the voters. This proposed reduction, should Jarvis II pass, in conjunction with last year's cuts(10%), will have a serious and long lasting impact on the Department's ability in carrying out the on-going programs.

If you are concerned, and are a tax payer and/or a hunting or fishing license buyer, please sign the enclosed petition. 

Dog Fishing Days

My cast had been made well ahead of a cruising prospect which I had spotted amongst some foliage. The rod had responded nicely and my line had shot out depositing my fly softly next to some bushes. We crouched low, hoping not to be spotted, and watched until my prey had spotted the fly. Quickly I started to strip line, trying to imitate a frantic dash on the part of my fly, and I was rewarded with one of the most vicious strikes I had ever in my life encountered. I stepped back, set the hood, and when the steel bit home all hell broke loose! At first there was a vibrating tug, such as a giant salmon would give, only much more; my prey, having established that it was not going to be able to dislodge my hood easily, took off on what was to become many runs. Directions were changed, leaps like anything anyone has ever seen; spectacular fishing!!!!! After a while Bob Naugahide, our guide, leaned over my shoulder and asked how things were going. "Fine," I told him. "I still can't believe this is really happening!" Here I was in the back of a pickup truck, parked just off of Mendocino Avenue, near downtown Santa Rosa, with an 85 lb. Doberman on the end of my line which had just struck my number 12/0 Royal Wuff Mailman! But let me tell you how I happened to get here before I let you know the outcome of this fight.

One night at home, I was quietly tying flies when "Tooth" Columbus burst in on me. "I've just had one of the most incredible fishing adventures of my life!" he screamed. THINGS TO BE AWARE OF

As you may be aware of, your club tries to take a stand resembeling an apolitical nature in most things; however there are three issues coming up which we feel that we should throw in our own two cents about.

PROPOSITION #1; On June 3ed this will be on the ballot. We recommend giving it your immediate attention. Prop. #1 will place millions of dollars, both state and federal, into restoring salmon and steelhead. The goal is to bring these species back to two-thirds of their historical levels, currently they are surviving at one-third of their historical level.

PROPOSITION 9 or JAWS II/JARVIS II: If your anything like me, right now the last thing you want to hear is anything else about Prop. 9. Your mind is probably made up and will everyone stop pounding their drums so you can get some peace. Right? I know just bear with me for a little. First, the DFG will only suffer a cut of 2 - 3%, not a lot but with 15 to 10% inflation this adds up. OK who's going to really feel the pressure? Richard May, president of CalTrout, lists the Department of Forestry, water Resources Control Board, Regional Water Quality Boards, and Department of Water Resources and agencies targeted for serious budget and program reductions if the measure passes. He also believes DFG's Environmental Services Branch would be virtually crushed. What this means is that these agencies which try to maintain unpolluted, unsilted waterways, and we know how important to fisheries this is, would be severely reduced in force.

This is interesting in that if both Props. 1 and 9 pass they rule each other out in that the funding lost by Prop. #9 would be generated by Prop.#1, in a sense, and we end up no better off. But, if Prop. #9 doesn't pass and Prop. #1 does, then we are a whole lot better off as far as the fisheries are concerned, something to think about.

HR 4223 or WILD AND SCENIC LEGISLATION FOR THE UPPER STANISLAUS RIVER CANYON

The Stanislaus River Canyon in the central Sierra Nevada of California is in imminent danger of being destroyed. Many concerned organizations including CalTrout, and individuals have worked together since 1974 to save this unique river canyon from being totally inundated by New Melones Reservoir. The Stanislaus River Canyon is visited by over 100,000 hikers, boaters, anglers, and cavers every year. It is the second most used river area in the nation. Because of its easy access, the Stanislaus is used by more disabled people than any other wilderness area in California. Priends of the River, a California based organization has led in the forfront to save the upper Stanislaus, above Parrott's Ferry, from being buried by the waters of the New Melones Reservoir. This is four miles of prime white water which is enjoyed every year by white water enthusiasts, anglers, and all natural river lovers. It's more than worth your interest and involvement.

A group out of Angles Camp called Environmental Traveling Companions uses both the river and the surrounding area for trips to blind and disabled people. If you have ever worked with these handicapped people and seen the joy come on their faces when the realize that they are able to perform the functions we take for granted, then you will see why I say, SAVE THE STANIS* LAUS!!!

Right now, today, sit down and write to Don Clausen, (House Office Bldg., Washington D.C., 20515), Tell him to east his vote in favor of saving this wild resorse for all of us to enjoy. Some of you may think, Hell I don't raft, why should I worry? Well I'll tell you this, if we don't try to save this river, who's going to care when we try to save another river. Write Don Clausen now, I'm going to and I hope I can count on you to do likewise.



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

And why is this? It boils down to a simple fact. Cameras and water just don't mix. With any camera, except a \$350.00 job put out by Nikon, a little water and you end up with high priced, soggy, optical junk. Minolta has come up with something to solve this delemma, it's called the Minolta Weathermatic-A. Here's a camera, in an affordable price range, which can function just as well on the stream or at your little girl's birthday party. It comes e quipped with a glass (kodak's are plastic) lens, shock-resistant case, built in flash, 5-position focusing dial (from 9 inches to infinity, and exposure dial for the three main light conditions. The film format is 110 and four types of film are available for it. Two color print, ASA 100 and 400, color slide, ASA 64, and black and white, ASA 125. Power comes from one 1.5v AA battery and the weight with camera, film and batter is around 14 ounces. It's heavy for a 110 but that's because this camera is built to take it. You can throw it in a bag and go. No cuddling this baby. Here's the good part. Your on the stream stalking that one rising fish and down you go, over your head into the hole you didn's see or head over heels on that submerged log, don't worry about your camera; it is designed to be able to be submerged, you can take it down up, or should we say down, to 15 feet with no problems and lets face it, if we're on the stream and happen to go down more than that 15 feet, chances are that we won't be worried about our pictures anyway. So now when we're on the stream we can have this hanging around our neck with us, ready to catch that trout taking your dry, or leaping in the air. Your very own fish action photographes. There's one further thing, if you happen to drop this into the drink, it even floats! The Minolta Weathermatic-A sells right now for \$119.95.

NOPTHERN CALIFORNIA FISHING REPORT

TROUT We are having a late spring this year and it is raising hell with the streams. Except for the spring creeks all the rivers and streams are full and flowing. Hopefully by the end of the month the runoff will diminish and fishing should improve.

SHAD Shad are showing in the Yuba, Feather, and Sacramento in good numbers in various places, you'll have to seek them out because they move around. There are some shad in the Russian River now but in no great or really mentionable numbers.

BASS AND PANFISH These fish are really in their own right now. I talked with someone yesterday and they caught quite a few smallmouths right above the Healdsberg dam, up to $2\frac{1}{2}$ pounds. If you have access to some of the many farm ponds in the area, pack up your rods and go, you'll have a great time.

NEXT MONTH

TFOUT If, the damnable weather goes back to normal, trout fishing should improve, look for a possibility of steelhead showing in the lower Klamath at the end of July.

SHAD Should remain good in the first part of the month, diminishing toward the end of the month, maby they'll even show in the Russian. BASS AND PANFISH Gone, the hotter weather will put them down, Kien de la Caca.




FISHING REPORT

Grind up a peanut shell (remove peanuts first) in a dubbing blender. Coat thread with peanut butter (used instead of wax). NOTE: Don't use crunchy style peanut butter. Dub crushed peanut shells onto thread. Wrap shank of hook with dubbing to a full taper. Two turns of brown hackle and whip finish but don't use head cement because it mixes poorly with peanut butter.

Hook: 94840, size 8

Thread: Light brown 8/0

Tail: Moose body hair; light brown

Body and Wing: Peanut shell (double peanut)

Tying instructions: Tie in tail ½ length of hook shank. Take one double peanut and carefully split the shell at the seams and remove the peanuts. Releasing Fish The following information is supplied by Cal Trout.

RELEASING FISH


By following a few simple rules you can be certain that released fish will live to be caught again. Remember that a fish that appears unharmed when released may not survive if not carefully handled.

- [1] Time is of the essence. Play and release fish as rapidly as possible. A fish out of water cannot live for more than three or four minutes because of brain damage due to loss of oxygen. A fish played gently for too long may be too exhausted to recover.
- [2] Keep the fish in the water as much as possible. A fish out of water is suffocating and, in addition, is many times heavier. He may pound himself fatally if allowed to flop on beach or rocks. Even a few inches of water under a thrashing fish acts as a protective cushion.
- [3] Gentleness in handling is essential. Keep your fingers out of the gills. Do not squeeze small fish they can be lifted and held easily holding them by the lower lip.

Nets are helpful provided the mesh does not become entangled in the gills. Hooks and lines catching in nets may delay releasing, so keep net in water.

- [4] Unhooking: Remove the hook as rapidly as possible with longnosed pliers UNLESS FISH IS DEEPLY HOOKED. If deeply hooked, cut the leader and leave the hook in. Do not tear out hooks roughly. Be gentle and quick. Small fish, especially, may die from shock from tearing out a hook. A freely bleeding fish should be killed and kept for the pan, if regulations allow.
- [5] Reviving: Some fish, especially after a long struggle, may lose consciousness and float belly-up. Always hold the fish in the water upright, heading upstream. Move the fish forward and backward so that water runs through the gills. This is artificial respiration and may take a few minutes, especially in lakes. When it revives, begins to struggle and can swim normally, then release it to survive and challenge another fisherman. You have done your job well.



Trout- This is the best time of the year for the dry fly fisherman because the streams are low and in good condition. Also, most people are back in school or have returned from vacation and are back at work. This means more room on the streams so you can pick your spot.



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

FLY OF THE LAGE

Emerging caddis; (Attributable to hal Junesen)

Good all season on the Williamson, and during March and April on Baum Lake. On Hat Creek it is good mid day, but body should be more olive color with no orange. In any case, the body color should match the color of the weed or stream bottom whence the pupa emerges.

Materials: Hook: 9671 or 7957EX, sizes10-14

Weighting: 6-8 turns buss fuse wire 1 amp.

Thread: Olive Nymo

Body: Mixed fur (For the Williamson River)

5% bright orange

10% olive plus fine copper wire

Hackle: Very short purplish brown, single turn,


trimmed on top.

Thorax: Peacock herl

Procedure: Flatten tip of fuse wire and tie into hook shank about 1/8 inch behind head. Take 6 - 8 turns of wire

- along the hook shank toward the bend, and lock down with criss cross turns of tying thread. Break off the wire at the end of the last turn. Seal the wire wraps with clear finger nail polish and set aside to dry.
- Stop 2. Tie in the single hackle feather together with a single flue of peacock herl just ahead of the wire wrap.
- to a point where the bend of the hook begins, and tie in a short length of fine copper wire.
- Step 4. Spin body fur dubbing mix onto tying thread and wrap forward over hook body and tie in just ahead of wire. Follow with 6 8 turns of copper wire and tie in.
- fibres slanted toward the rear of the hook and the in.
 Trim off the hackle fibres from the top side.
- Step 6. Make a thorax about 1/6 the length of the hook with 3 or 4 turns of herl. Tie off and finish the head in the usual manner.

FISHING REPORT by HAL JANSSEN

This month's report is courtesy of Hal Janssen. John Christlieb, who normally provides this information is on a fishing trip.

Hat Creek- The fishing is excellent in the morning on caddis and mayfly nymphs. During the afternoon the fish are rising to spinners and hoppers.

Baum Lake- Browns and rainbows to 4 lbs. are rising all day to midges. You should be using floating lines and long leaders a la Hal Janssen.

Rising river and the Fall River- The action here is good. Use black leeches in the Rising River all day long. Fish are rising to blue winged olives in the Fall River. Action here is best in the evening.

Salmon- There is considerable chub action in the lower Eel. Use a small silver body black hackle fly.

Klamath- There are numerous half pounder steelhead. Use small trout size nymphs for the best action.

Spring Lake- The fishing for bluegill and bass on top water poppers is fantastic. The poppers should be all black or frog colored.

This month's hot tip- Lake Berryessa is the place to be on these cool mornings. The rainbows rise to the spawning thread fin shad. These are good size fish. Use a small shad imitation (Hal's looks like the real thing) and fish the coves from a belly boat. A pram frightens the fish.

Editor's note: Recently it is rumored that Hal hooked a brown in excess of 15 lbs. in Hat Greek and almost landed it. Knowing Hal I can believe it!!!

STREAM REPORT

This is the first of what we propose to be a series of reports on various trout streams that members have visited during the year.

We solicit from our membership reports approximately 250 to 300 words describing the following features: Name of the stream, location, flow conditions during the seasons, fish populations, fishing regulations, accessibility, and personal observations.

We will start off with our recent experience as an example of what we have in mind.

BOISIE RIVER (south fork in Idaho)- This is the south fork of the river between Arrow Rock dam and Anderson Ranch dam. The release from the upstream Anderson Ranch dam is fairly constant at about 1000 cubic feet per second during the summer and cannot be crossed by wading at that time of year due to swift current and lack of shallow bars. About September 1, the flow is reduced to perhaps 600 c.f.s. and the river is wadable in places. The stream flows through a deep canyon and contains many fine pools and rapids with large boulders in the bed, providing good oxygen and holding places for fish. From casual observation the fish population consists mainly of suckers and wild rainbow trout in good numbers. There is a good distribution of size in the trout population with a fair number of fish in the 4-6 lb. class. The wild trout population is maintained by a size minimum of 12 inches, single barbless hooks, (no bait, flies or lures only) and a 3 bag limit. Year round fishing is permitted. There is no stocking of trout in this river.

The raver is accessible by road from Anderson Ranch dam downstream for a distance of about 12 miles. Below that the river is roadless for about 20 miles, but is accessible by boat all the way to Arrow Rock reservoir.

We fished the river in early August with high water and found the fish taking grasshoppers because a hopper infestation was prevailing in the area.

We fished the river again in mid September with low water and had fine sport with No. 14 light Cahill fished dry. A heavy emergence of what appeared to be little yellow stone flies seemed to be preferred by trout of all sizes despite a surplus of grasshoppers.

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
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EDITOR'S NOTE- This is a letter that our club received from Cal Trout. The RRFF Board would like it known that they stand in favor of placing our northcoast rivers under the California Wild and Scenic Rivers Act and urge all its members to write to Secretary Andrus asking him to do so. Please consider this request.

Russian River Fly Fishers P.O. Box 2673 Santa Rosa, CA 95405 September 19, 1980

In 1972 you and we together won a great victory when Governor Reagan signed SB 107, the California Wild and Scenic Rivers Act.

Reagan received thousands of letters urging him to do it. A great many of those letters were generated at angling club meeting when club members were provided paper, pens, and envelopes to dash off a few lines right then and there at the meeting. It was a very successful technique.

In the closing months of 1980 we face a similar challenge, an even bigger opportunity. The recent passage of legislation authorizing the Peripheral Canal poses a huge new threat to our protected northcoast rivers. The protective provisions of the state Wild Rivers Act will prove fatally frail once the peripheral plumbing is in place.

Recognizing this, Governor Brown has asked Secretary Andrus to place the rivers under federal protection by adding them to the National wild rivers system. Approval by Andrus (which he can do without referral to Congress) would prohibit federal dams on those streams. Because of the Peripheral Canal legislation, federal dams are an increased threat, in fact the only remaining real threat.

Brown's request is controversial and Andrus is under heavy pressure to deny. We believe Andrus wants to approve but he will need massive evidence of public support to neutralize the hard-working water lobbyists and their congressional pawns.

So the time is now, like never before, to take up pen and paper and send Secretary Andrus a simple one-liner: "I urge you to approve Governor Brown's request to protect California's northcoast rivers by adding those rivers to the national Wild and Scenic Rivers System."

I will try to contact you to discuss arrangements for getting these letters out at your next regular club meeting, although I'm certain you know what to do and how to do it. I can't over-stress how important this is. The campaign in 1972 for SB 107 truly was important, but the 1980 campaign is crucial. A great and final victory is within our reach if we will only grasp it.




Fishing Report by John Christlieb ---- The Western Angler

Trout- The season closes on November 16, 1980 so make plans to go now. Watch the weather reports very carefully because conditions can change daily. Many lakes are open all year round and can be very productive. A few streams such as Putah Creek, King's River, and the Trinity River are open all year round. Locally watch Lake Berryessa(it can exceed all expectations).

Steelhead- So far it has been too early for many streams and we need rain to open the mouths of the rivers. The klamath has been very good this year all the way up to Happy Camp. As the next few days pass by keep your eyes on the Russian River.

Salmon- As of this writing there has not been much action. The Eel has been the best but if we don't have rain the river will be closed to fishing. Once again the situation changes daily so for the latest information call the Western Angler at 542-4432.



Beginning on November 19th for seven Wednesday nights I will teach Basic Fly Tying to members of the Russian River Fly Fishers, Inc. The location will be Warrack Hospital conference room: 4700 Hoen Ave., Santa Rosa. The first session will consist of a course description and explanation of the required materials.



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
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
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FLY OF THE MONTH- TIDEWATER SHRIMP

Now that the Kings, the Silvers and the Steelhead are on the move, it is timely to consider a fly for these splendid fish. Bob Wray's tidewater shrimp is such a fly and with his kind permission we offer it for your collection.

MATERIALS:

Hackle......Orange, palmered over front half of body Shellback & Tail. Brown bucktail from top of bucktail

PROCEDURE:

- 1. Weight the body with 10-15 turns of 2 amp fuse wire and anchor with tying thread. Wind the tying thread forward of the butt about 1/8 of an inch. At that point tie in a 10 inch length of polyglitter. Also tie in an 8 inch loop of tying thread at that point before continuing forward to the midpoint of the hook shank.
- 2. Wrap the polyglitter forward toward the middle of the hook, building an even taper in the process. Tie off the polyglitter at the midpoint but leave the standing end uncut.
- 3. Wrap the tying thread forward toward the head of the hook and tie to within 1/8 inch of the eye of the hook and tie in the tip of an orange hackle clipped short on one side and stroked back toward the butt to flare the fibres.
- 4. Wrap the hackles back toward the butt with four or five turns evenly spaced to the midpoint. Wrap the tying thread back to the midpoint to tie down the hackle and then forward to the head wrap the polyglitter forward between the hackle turns and tie off at the head. Clip the hackle fibres from the top of the hook.
- 5. Tie in a clump of brown bucktail hair butt first just behind the eye of the hook. Shear the hair butts on an even taper to the eye of the hook. Seal with lacquer and whip finish the head.
- 6. Clip one thread at the butt of the thread loop, and use the extended thread to tie the deer hair down to the butt of the body forming the shellback and tail. Finish the tie with several half hitches before cutting the thread.



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REDWOOD EMPIRE FISHING AS OF DECEMBER 9. 1980

The rivers of the Empire are clearing after the rains of the end of November, and if the weather holds most should be fishable by the time this CAST reaches you.

Starting with the north end of our region, the report on the Smith is that it is now excellent for Salmon and Steelhead.

The Klamath is improving and the Trinity is clear above the South Fork. The Klamath is producing larger than usual Steelhead this year with many in the 8 to 10 pound size.

The Eel is clearing and should be good by the 15th of December if the weather holds. All tributaries on the lower Eel are open to fishing. Both Salmon and Steelhead are showing in the South Fork. Some of the Salmon are fresh from the ocean.

The Gualala is clear but not many fish are showing yet.

We have no report on either the Navarro or the Garcia.

The Russian is still too muddy for fly fishing and we have no reports of fish taken.

Don't forget Berryessa. Jim Hakel had good sport on a Hal Janssen threadfin imitation at Markley Cove the day after Thanksgiving. Berryessa is a sometime lake.

When the threadfin minnows are schooling on the surface it's great. But that doesn't happen every day, even in the late fall when the trout come up to the surface.

If you get skunked at Berryessa don't forget to try Putah Creek below the dam. It is fly fishing only there.

Although Putah creek fishing took a beating with the weed eradication program, it has been restocked and some of the trout are of a decent size now.

Winter fishing is so affected by the weather that it can be predicted only by watching your satellite pictures on the T V news reports.

It's a good idea to call ahead for local information before risking the cost of a distant trip.

The "Fish Line" in Eureka, 442-8552 will get you up-to-date advice on the northern streams.

As you walk through the redwoods that are dripping from the heavy mist, you reflect for a moment on what it is about a steelhead that almost possesses you.

Is it the frozen gravel bar or perhaps the lush green ferns that line the river banks? Maybe it's the strike. Many times you have had ice in the guides, and had a fish rip three feet of running line through your frozen fingers before you could set the hook. Your mind slips back to last year when, after a fifteen minute battle, you beach a brand-new 12 pound female. She is so gorgeous lying there, all silver, with six sea lice on her anal fin. Quickly, you reach down and remove the fly. Gently, you grab her tail and slide her into the stream. As you move her back and forth in the water, you feel her strength returning until suddenly she slips from your grasp, and is gone.

Yes, you're not quite sure what it is about steelhead that fascinates you; "all you know is that you'll be here every time you get a chance!

FLY OF THE MONTH

Bob Wray's GREEN SHELLBACK COMET

The big rain of early December has opened the rivers to the waiting steelhead, and if the ensuing fair weather holds, the streams should be fishable to flies by the time this issue reaches our readers, if not before. The Green Shellback Comet might be worth a try.

MATERIALS

HOOK: Mustad 7957 BX or 3406 (ringeye) sizes 6-8.

THREAD: 4234 Dark green Nymo

TAIL: Chartreuse green bucktail


BODY: Gold Polyglitter

SHELLBACK: Small dark green chenille

HACKLE: Chartreuse color EYES: Gold bead chain WEIGHTING: 2 amp. fuse wire

PROCEDURE

- 1. Tie in 10-15 turns of 2 amp fuse wire in the middle section of the hook shank. Secure with crossing wraps of tying thread and lacquer.
- 2. The tail of the comet is tied long and high and is tied onto the shank of the weighted hook, followed by the gold polyglitter and the dark green chenille.
- 3. The polyglitter is first wrapped under the tail to cause it to set at a high angle above the shank of the hook, then the tapered body is formed with the polyglitter, leaving room forward for the hackle andthe bead eyes.
- 4. The green shellback is pulled over the body and tied down in front. The chartreuse hackle is tied in, shiny side forward, wrapped 4 turns and tied off.
- 5. The bead eyes are tied in as follows:
 - a. With tying thread, build a lump on the hook shank directly behind the eye.
 - b. Place the pair of bead eyes on top of the hook against the rear of the thread hump and secure with several figure 8 loops of tying thread. Whip finish the head and lacquer.



There is something in our psyche that prompts us to keep feeding quarters into the one-arm bandit, climbing horrendous mountains, going to the moon, or keep on casting when we haven't had a strike all day. Optimism? Curiosity? Whatever.

Perhaps it can be expressed by the following excerpts from McElligot's Pool by Dr. Seuss.

Than you or I know!."



FISHING PLACES

In accordance with our policy of informing our readers of current conditions of waters that are less well known and therefore less crowded we offer a report on some lakes and streams in northern Yosemite Park by Bill Archuleta.

In referring to reports of the fishing on ponds and lakes it should be remembered that conditions change from year to year. Sometimes a severe winter will kill all fish in small or shallow lakes. In some cases introduction of eastern brook trout will overwhelm the food supply and result in a population of undersized fish. This has been a problem in many Sierra lakes and streams.

Herewith is Bill's report:

"On August 30, Mark Kammerling and I headed for Kennedy Meadow pack station on the Stanislaus River just west of Sonora Pass. There we rented a pack burro at \$18.00 per day (and well worth the price!) and were instructed in the intricacies of burro management.

Mark was equipped with a 5 piece ultra light spin outfit, while I was attempting my first all-fly fishing trip.

The first day out we camped at Lunch Meadow on Summit Creek about 10 miles above Kennedy Meadows. The creek yielded plenty of pan size rainbows on any dark pattern, sizes 16-18 fished dry.

The following day we puffed our way over Emigrant Pass at 9600 feet and on through Bond Pass at 9800 feet and into Mosemite Park where we made camp on the shore of Dorothy Lake. Here Mark caught a few rainbows up to 10 inches on small spinners and wobblers. Flies, fished dry, were more successful. Anything black worked. I caught rainbows up to 18" until my arm hurt.

During the next four days we fished around among the nearby lakes including Lakes Bonnie, Stella, Harriett, Ruth and Helen. Those girls really get around! At Ruth Lake, 9600 feet, I had the pleasure of catching my first golden trout. Unforgettable beauty. The clarity of these lakes is breathtaking! Some are very deep, but the bottom is often visible.

The streams draining these lakes form the headwaters of the West Walker River that drains into Bridgeport Reservoir on the East side of the Sierra. Dorothy Lake drains into Fall Creek that flows west through Jack Main Canyon and into the Tuolumme at Hetch Hetchy Reservoir. All of these streams are filled with pan size trout.

During our stay we kept enough eighteen inchers for one meal, and the rest were released. The trout readily took Black Ant, Musquito and Adams patterns in sizes 10 through 16.

I would recommend going right after Labor Day. The fishing is better and the campsites and trails are less busy. This is wilderness area and wilderness access requires permits obtainable at trailhead. Special regulations apply and are designed for your safety. Observe them and enjoy your visit."



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

Dear Supporter of this National Committee:

As you know by now, we had a wild, shouting and drum thumping senate public hearing in Seattle a couple of weeks ago. The Indian fishermen from all over the Northwest came to disrupt and play havoc with this hearing, and they were quite successful.

The hearing auditorium in the Federal Building was jammed with screaming Indians in typical tribal dress.... headbands, jeans and disco shirts. They brought their drums into the auditorium and pounded out their chants and hatred for the sportsmen.

This was the radical element....these were not the Indians we know. We've worked on too many fishing programs with the Indian tribes and, believe me, these screaming Indians were simply not the same Indians.

The sportsmen were there in mass. However, our guys 'hung in there' and didn't allow the Indian radicals to force them into a fight. Even when some Indians were carrying knives on their belts, threatening some of our supporters.

It wasn't that we were afraid to tangle with this crazy bunch but, we would have received the negative publicity and headlines reading, "Sportsmen terrorize native Americans at public hearing." We're just too smart to be sucked into that trap. And as a consequence, the legislators thanked us for our patience and understanding. It was obvious to all that we were on our best behavior under a great deal of pressure.

This public hearing did nothing for us, really. Sure, we testified for the "Steelhead Trout Protection Act" and our testimony was great. Even though the Indians yelled and shouted all through our presentations. But this wasn't the place where our bill will live or die. That's in Washington, D.C.

The legislators are going home for their August recess. However, when they get back to the Capitol after Labor Day, our bill will have a special two day hearing. And there, my friends, the full committee will ask questions, make comments and form opinions. At that point, we must present all of our facts in objective summation because that hearing will determine whether our bill moves forward or simply dies.

Please understand that trying to pass National legislation in the Congress of the United States is 'hard ball' politics. There simply is no chance for "sport fishing club, do-it-yourself politics."

We are using professional help all the way. And frankly, it cost's a lot of money. Trout Unlimited found that out when they hired a professional to help the lobbying effort. It's costing them \$150 per hour. That's right...per hour!

We need to raise a lot of money for our continuing lobbying effort. The easiest way, we think, is to have a good raffle. And that's what we're doing. The raffle tickets you have received with this letter is our life blood. This is the way we're going to be able to pay for professional help.

So please, buy a book of tickets for ten dollars. Or, sell your book to someone else. But steelheader, please help us out. We have built the biggest lobbying effort the steelheaders in this country have ever put together, and it would be tragic to see it fall apart because we couldn't raise enough money from sport fishermen to accomplish our common goal...to decommercialize steelhead trout once and for all.

The Indians have one of the largest lobbying establishment in the United States, right there in Washington, D.C. And, if we are to take them on in the Halls of Congress, we need to build a war chest of at least \$50,000. If we can sell these raffle tickets it will help pay for our lobbying effort and campaign right through the fall season. And that, my fellow anglers, is a must.

After many months of pushing and shoving, our National Steelhead Trout Committee is finally on the field ready to play professional 'hard ball.' I hope you will stay with us and support us, because we can't win this one without you.
