RESTORATION CONFERENCE
DRAWS LAWMAKERS AND
40 ORGANIZATIONS

A U.S. Congressman and a State Assembly-man joined some 250 people concerned with fisheries restoration for the 2nd annual Salmon and Steelhead Restoration Conference in Eureka.

Between 35 and 40 organizations interested in restoring salmon and steelhead habitat and populations were represented at the Conference held earlier this month.

In attendance were Representative Doug Bosco and Assemblyman Dan Hauser, both active in fisheries preservation and restoration. Rep. Bosco, while a state assemblyman, together with state senator Barry Keene, established a salmon and steelhead restoration fund out of revenues from geothermal projects.

At our last club meeting, Liz Wray reported on the status of the RRFF Casting Pool Project, following a meeting of the Committee. which she chairs. about all of the details and construction plans have been completed and groundbreaking is tentatively set for May. Due to the necessity of altering original plans because of ground composition, contours, etc., the cost of construction probably will be higher than originally estimated. Also, it is necessary to go into concrete for the pool rather than asphalt as had been planned.

To meet the anticipated higher cost of the project the Committee is renewing efforts to raise additional funds. In addition to seeking individual and corporate donations, another project benefit

FISHING LICENSE PRICE
CUT AND NUMBER OF
STAMPS IS REDUCED

If you haven't yet bought your 1984 fishing license, you'll be happy to hear that the price of a general-purpose license has been cut to \$13. That allows you to fish for everything but striped bass. A striper stamp costs \$3.50 and is good until Dec. 31, 1985.

The resident ocean fishing license is priced at \$7.50 and allows you to fish for salmon and steelhead, but not for stripers. There is a 50¢ fee to the issuing agent.

Another change is in the elimination of individual stamps for trout, etc. Your general purpose license covers


everything but the exceptions noted.

The Fish & Game Department sells 2.4 million fishing licenses a year, bringing in revnues of some \$29 million. According to acting F&G Director Don Carper, the new regulations will increase revenues by 2.5%.

At the same time, Carper said, it will also "reduce paperwork and confusion associated with a number of licenses, stamps and permits, and decrease printing, storage and handling costs". Which presumably means more cash in hand for F&G.

The hope of fishermen is that at least some of the increased revenue and savings will go into intelligent fisheries management rather than into reserves or Certificates of Deposit.#

ENOS BRADNER 1893-1984

Enos Bradner, one of the Northwest's bestknown anglers, died on Feb. 12 in Seattle at the age of 90.

Bradner was for many years outdoor editor for the Seattle <u>Times</u>. He was author of <u>Northwest Angling</u>, published in 1950. It was one of the first and most widely read books dealing exclusively with sport fishing in that part of the country, though he had fished extensively throughout the USA, Alaska and the tropics.

An avid flyfisher, he developed a number of fly patterns, particularly for steelhead and salmon. Probably the best-known and still effective of his patterns is the Brad's Brat.

Bradner was one of the founders of the Washington Fly Fishing Club, in 1939, and served as it first president. He was an early, strong supporter of the Federation of Fly Fishers. In recognition of his services, FFF presented him with its most illustrious award, the Lapis Lazuli.

Bradner began fishing at the age of 8 and his fishing developed into a passion that never dimmed throughout his long and innovative life. He was a



In any case, I'd like to share some of what's been going on in your club. In addition to losing our President, Eric Elliott, who had to move to San Diego, we've also lost two Directors. Richard Hambright and ken Wilson (Vice President) have resigned from the Board for pressing business and personal reasons. Unfortunately, earning a living is still a high-ranking priority for most of us.

luckily, we've been able to recruit two extremely able and dedicated members to fill in till the July elections. Both are long-



time RRFF members and both have contributed mightily to the club since its founding. Grant King and Bob Sisson will be valuable additions to the Board and we welcome them.

A number of members have been wondering what's happening with

the club's Casting Pool Project. Basically, we've run into two related problems: engineering and financial. They're related because the nature of the pool site has forced changes in the original plans. Although alternative systems have been examined, the engineering reality is that the only feasible pool is a reinforced concrete one. Climatic and ground composition conditions rule out plastic or fiberglass, both of which have been looked at.

That's the engineering part. Which leads to the financial part. Cost estimates put the price of reinforced concrete, along with other construction necessities, at about \$140,000. At present, we have just under \$40,000 in the till.

The Board of Directors has decided that if the project is going to be carried out,

KEENE BILL AIMED AT RESTORING STATE FISHERIES

A three-pronged Bill aimed at restoring the State's fisheries to their former glory has been introduced in the California Legislature by Senator Barry Keene.

The Bill, according to Sen Keene, would do

three things:

- 1. Enact a new state fish restoration policy. For the first time, state policy would be to restore and, where feasible, enhance our fishery resources. Responsible state agencies would be required to develop detailed plans for carrying out this policy, and to report their progress to the Legislature and public periodically.
- 2. Provide \$5 million every year for restoration of fish habitat. The \$5 million would be redirected from water project construction funds.
- 3. Require the California Water Commission to ask the federal government to correct the damage to fish that has been caused by federal dams and other federal water projects.

"Economic sense and simple fairness require us to restore our fishery resources," Keene said. "Given two or three decades of restoration work, I believe we can begin to (cont'd next page)

RRFF STEELHEAD/SALMON FLIES DISPLAYED IN EASTERN MUSEUM EXHIBIT

Two dozen typical West Coast steelhead and salmon flies, tied by Grant King as a contribution from RRFF, went on display April 1 at the Berkshire Nuseum in New York State. The exhibit, titled, "Fly Tying, Fly Fishing: The Gentle Art," featured flies from every part of the coun-



try and represented the work of some 91 tyers.

Also on display were fly tying equipment, tackle, books and paintings. The exhibit was scheduled to run from April 1 through May 13, but probably will be extended because of its popularity.


Along with the flies he tied, King provided the names of the originators and histories of the flies. King's "Boss" series had to be included at the insistence of the museum people. These were the Doss, Flaming Boss and the Gulala Boss. In addition, eight other king designs were included. Among others were the Skunk, Thor, Joe O'Donnell, Fall Favorite, Silver Hilton and Baird's Black Demon. And, of course, Black and Silver Comets.

Co-curators of the exhibit were Hermann Kessler, co-author of several books and former art director of Field & Stream magazine. and his wife, Helen Shaw, internationally famous fly tyer and author of the trailblazing book, "Fly Tying, first published in 1963, with a second edition in 1979 and still a standard text on the subject.

When he started putting the exhibit to-



SOME NOTES ON THE INDIAN
VALUEY OUTING OF MAY 18-20

This writer visited Indian Valley two weekends in succession and found some interesting changes from the previous year.

- Two years of high water levels in the lake have killed most of the oak trees that used to shade the camping flats.
- 2. As the lake level changes fish change their feeding areas. For example, on the weekend of May 12,13 water covered some of the grassy flats at the upper end of the lake east of the bridge, to a depth of about 3 feet. Many school bass were foraging on the flat. By the week end of May 19,20 the water level had dropped about 18". The bass had abandoned the flat and moved into a deeper side channel choked with brush and fallen trees. They rose well there to weedless popping bugs, whereas during the previous week, when they were in the open water. They were extremely wary and hard to catch in daylight but took a muddler minnow well after sunset.
- 3. Bartlett Creek, which enters the lake at its north end has a very interesting evening rise of large trout that come up from the lake and move

into the stream to feed upon the numerous flies and nymphs that hatch in the creek.

This happy situation probably prevails only while water temperatures in the creek are suitable for trout.

From comments by some of the members it appears that bass fishing was less successful this year than last. This may have been a temporary condition, because many bass were observed in the estuary of Bartlett creek during the weekend of May 12,13.

#### CASTING POOL PROJECT - A NOTE OF CORRECTION

In your cast issue of May 1984, a statement was made that "the only feasible pool is a reinforced concrete one" due to climatic and ground conditions at the site.

The situation prevailing is such that the expansion-contraction properties of the adobe type soil at the site would require either of two alternatives.

1. A heavily reinforced concrete basin resting upon an 18 inch layer of compacted subsoil of properties not subject to swelling and shrinking. This subsoil would have to be brought in from some source at this time unknown.

This alternative would cost something in the \$120,000 - \$140,000 range.

2. A second alternative, using a plastic liner on the bottom of the pool, bedded on a gravel base with sand topping and surrounded by a reinforced concrete rim wall and an asphalt concrete walkway could be built for about \$40,000.

Plastic liners have been used in numerous constructions of this type with success and there is reason to believe it would be successful in our casting pool.


The advantage of the plastic liner is that its cost is within range of available funds and would solve the problems of unstable soil at minimum cost.

The disadvantage is that its service life would be about 20 years whereas a properly built concrete pool might be expected to last indefinitely with minimum maintanance.

These alternatives have not been presented to the Recreation and Parks Depart-'ment of Santa Rosa pending their further consideration by our membership.

2. Tie eyes at 45° angle, clip off excess and wrap head with one strand of peacock herl.

3. To make claws, use pheasant of chukkar flank feather. Tie in claws behind head and beneath body.

4. Take three 1/3" sections of pheasant tail, tying one each for right and left legs, saving excess for back abd tail. 5. Tie on third section on top, flatten three on the back and tie in segments with thread.

6. Soak back and tail with clear cement and flatten and trim tail as it dries.







## YANCEY'S Fishing Trip to Wyoming

Flowing out of the base of the mighty Wind River Mountains in northwestern Wyoming, the upper New Fork River offers classic brown trout float fishing at its best.

When Jack Dennis joined us as our guest speaker for the December dinner meeting, I took the opportunity to pick his brains about the New Fork, a river that one gains access to only through Jack's shop in Jackson Hole. A few weeks & many phone calls later, seven days on various Wyoming waters was confirmed for the 20th-26th of July for myself and fishing friends Bob Quigely, Rick Piscitello & Ken Johns.

We spent 3 glorious days floating the New Fork in 2 boats with master guides Robbi & Elaine Garrett. Robbi & Elaine have been guiding on the New Fork for 12 years & were, without question, the finest & most professional guides I have ever fished with. The Garretts, by the way, will be living in Dillon, Montana, next year where they will be concentrating on local waters, especially their favorite, the Beaverhead. Robbi will also be putting his 20 years of rod building expertise to work by joining the Winston Rod Company staff at Twin Bridges.

The upper New Fork is beautiful beyond description. It starts out as rather small, crystal clear, a winding meadow stream with undecut banks, long glides & deep pools at the bends. The banks are lined with willows & as the river receives additional inflows large cottonwoods join their smaller brethren. The buzzing nemesis of all waters, the mosquito, was present in force, but only on shore; we stopped as seldom as possible.

The fish were as Jack described, most in the 1 - 3 lb. range with a prependerance of 2-2½ lb., 18 - 20 inch brightly colored & highly acrobatic browns. Jack's personal largest was 7 lbs. Ours was 4 lbs. Two days after we left Jack photographed Robbi landing a beautiful 5 lb. fish as part of a film to be presented at the '84 Conclave. We also caught brooks & rainbows to 18 inches as bonus fish. Each angler landed about 30 fish daily, so there was never a dull moment.



Equipment included 6 & 7 wt. graphite & bamboo rods throwing weight forward floating lines. 9 - 12 foot leaders tested out to 6 lb. tippets to turn over the fairly large flies: sized 4 - 10 brown Yuk Bugs (a variation of the famous Montana Grindle Bug), grey Kiwi Muddlers, white Muddlers & black Leeches. We also fished # 12 dry grey Wulffs to match the mid-day Mayfly hatches, but with only fair success.

An incredibly violent storm blew away our plans to fish both The Wind & Green Rivers & we had to retreat to the Henry's Fork of The Snake in Idaho for 2 days. The fishing was grand with rainbows up to 22 inches, but we were anxious to return to the very special treat awaiting us for our last day in Wyoming.

Jack had done the impossible; he had arranged for us to fish the State Senator's private ranch just out of Jackson Hole. The ranch is so private that it doesn't even have a name, not do the FOUR spring creeks within its boundaries. The fish were mostly Snake River

Only 2 other anglers had fished the creeks this year, unbelievable as that sounds! Just how well did we do on these buccolic waters? Well, Bob Moratto lent me his new Orvis 4 wt. ## Colorado's Newest

About 70 miles southeast of Durango, Colorado, the Los Pinos, Piedra, San Juan and Navajo rivers spill off the southwest flank of the San Juan Mountains and blend their waters in the newly created Navajo Reservoir.

The stream emerging from the base of the dam is cold and clear and reported to have become one of the beat trout streams in the lower 48 states.

Since my planned itinerary would take me to that vicinity I decided to risk the cost of a one-day fishing license (\$8.50) to check out the rumor. I'm very glad I did :

The stream below the dam has a flow about the same as the Klamath above Wietchpek in mid-summer. It meanders through a narrow valley shaded by large cottonwoods. Access to the river is good from the north shore for a distance of perhaps 5 miles downstream from the dam.

About a mile downstream from the dam a fine cottonwood grove on the north bank provides a shady camping site. It is equipped with portable toilets but no potable water.

When I first approached the river on the afternoon of July 24, there were no fish rising. Several anglers were dunking various baits with little apparent success. Then a small thunderstorm blew up with a few splatters of rain and the river came alive with a hatch of little blue wing olives (flavilinea coloradensis?).

I switched from a sinking line and nymphs to a floater with a size 16 approximate imitation and had immediate action, but couldn't seem to hold the fish.



After four good fish on and off, inspection of the hook showed no point!

A new fly brought to hand four rainbows in succession in about one hour's fishing. All were strong fighters in the heavy current and ran from 14 " to 16 " in prime condition.

The only place that I fished was a run about 3 to 4 feet deep, about % mile long and close to 150 feet wide. The current was strong but wadeable. The bottom consisted of coarse gravel and cobblestones with a few large boulders scattered in various places.

A dense growth of weed in the quiet eddys gave ideal habitat for the various ephemeridae that support the fishery.

The fishery has attracted the usual commercial activity which centers about 5 miles downstream from the dam where a bridge crosses the river. Tackle, fishing guidea, boata and boating facilities are all there if needed.



### PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE



We have lost a great recreational facility and decent fishing water. --- keep an eye on Lake Ralphine mov ..





The Southfork of the Snake River in Southwestern Idaho had always teld a fase fraction for me. I had fished much of the Snake through the length of Grand Teton Nat'l. Fark in Wyoming for its thick Golden Cutthroats, and had fished the Northfork's famed box Canyon and Failroad Hanch for their large, sophisticated faintows. But, somehow, I always found myself driving past the Snake's beautiful and inviting Southfork.

This was the year that I was to Fish the Southfork, however, for my wife, Gael, and I had received an invitation to stay with friends who own a large ranch fronting on the Southfork.

I had read several articles and spoken with "locals" over the years who had raved about the premier brown trout fishing which occurred each fall as large mature fish moved up the Southfork from the main Snake near Idano Falls. More recently, the summer cutthroat fishing was being taunted as worthy of serious angling. I was hooked! My wife and I arrived during the first week in August anxious to start fishing.

The first thing I learned was trust the Southfork is not a river to be waded; it is simply too large and too swift. Besides, most of the access is private! Rather, the Southfork is a floater's paradise.

The Southfork begins as an Idaho tailwater fishery below the Parasades Reservoir, the dividing line between Idaho & Wyoming (and the southern entrance to the Tetons). Large brown very large browns live in that tailwater but one must fish deeper than I am interested in fishing in order to reach them.

After wading the ranch water for two days and fishing mostly small humpys for free rising cutthroats, we decided to spend several days froat fishing.

Each day for 3 days, we would explore different 10-mile sections, looking to find a section worthy of concentrating on sometime in the future.

The first day's float took us through the upper stretch, a section which we found to hold only medium sized cutts. True, they rose with predictable regularity, but their size was predictable also, and that takes away the element of surprise. The runs were long and straight and there was little significant holding water.

The second day found us Thoating the middle section, a section of unbelievable beauty and charm. As the day before, we started with dry deer hair humpys, but as the runs became deeper and the cutbanks reached further into the cliffs the water suggested streamers - big streamers. I quickly switched to a heavier weight Graphite II and on my first cast with a # 4 white muddler, a thick 18" cutt rushed out from underneath the bank and all but ripped my rod from my unsuspecting hands.

That was the start of a memorable day ! My host was fishing a 4-weight graphite rod and chose to continue rishing dry rather than switching to a heavier more wind-resistant streamer. He took fish all day. But fish for fish, they were smaller than the 16" - 20" cutts which at intervals slammed the white muddler.

Toward evening we pulled into the long awaited Fali Creek backwater. It was truly sturning with its wide waterfall dropping vertically almost 60° to the carm water below. We reached the waterfall by rowing 100 yards up the backwater and sat in its cool misting spray enjoying its soothing beauty.

Our guide had been trying in vain to prepare for the possibility of taking what he described as a "humungous trout fish" from this bonus water. But we weren't. inall honesty, prepared for what we saw next. It was one of those wonderful moments when nothing was being said, but the same thoughts were being shared by all. No one recalled what made us all turn around at the same moment, but we were all suddenly compelled to turn around in unison and look back towards the main river. We were shocked back into reality by the sight of the forewarmed "humungous" cutts feeding heavily in the eddyline separating the backwater from the main river. It was grand, such large trout clearing the water time and time again. They reminded me more of trained porpoises leapin in playful antics at an amusement park than wild trout in a wilderness setting.

With admenalin pumping, we worked with numbling fingers to the on new tippets and #12 bucktail caudis flies to represent the large caddis skittering across the quickly darkening surface. I was filled with the sense of satisfaction that we all seek on every fishing trip, that sense of fulfillment when the purpose of our trip presents itself in stark reality.

My cast would have to be a long one. Rhythm and strength worked together perfectly and the line shot out with the necessary distance and precision. Within moments, one of the large fish breached the surface and I struck. The response was like tying my line to the bumper of a vehicle powered by a large V-B: pure strength! I knew that the fight would focus on trying to keep the fish out of the main river, to keep him in his "home pool". Luckily, after the first few runs the fish went leep, diving me the opportunity to gain lost line.

I tailed to notice it earlier, but my partner was also booked up. Being less voeiferous than myself, he simply grirned as he expertly fought his fish. The rish Gods were on our side and we coth side our fish in within moments of each other. As if cast from the same mie, our two fish both teasured 22" - and were within an ounce of each other in weight: 4 lb. 7 oz - and 4 lb. 8 oz.

As quickly as we returned the fish to the water and replaced our flies, we worked line back out and were into two others from the same "pod". These fish were not subtly sipping miniscule dries like classic spring creek trout, but were thrashing the water recklessly like southsea billfish. We were beginning to think we had died and gone to heaven! One more fish followed the cycle of capture & release before the hatch stopped as suddenly as it had started. My partner and I were anxious to probe the depths of the large pool with the large streamers, but our guide wisely suggested that we move back into the river as there was but a half hour of daylight left and we still had two miles to our takeout at the southern terminous of the Swan Valley. We reluctantly resigned ourselves to the need to move on, but did so with the knowledge that the next day's float would take us deep into the gorge section of the

The gorge section, because of its lack of takeouts, receives less pressure than the upper river. It is also even more pristine because of its remoteness. As it turned out, my partner needed to return to unexpected ranch duties, leaving me to fish the gorge alone. I worked hard all day throwing the large white muddlers I so strongly favor, and caught many respectable fish, but none to compare to the Fall River backwater itsn from the day before.

After five straight days of fishing, my wife found it surprisingly easy to convince me to take a day off. The rest was well deserved. Besides, I still had two weeks left to fish western Montana and central Idano.

Fishing, by anyone's standards, had been good. We had landed well over 100 fish a day between us while floating, with five fish topping 4 lbs. The fish had ranged, on the average, from 12" to 16", with several 16" to 18" and had eagerly come to flies, both drys and streamers. Even after all this fine fishing, however, our guide spoke only of the fall runs of large browns and the tremendous action they provided. As far as he was concerned, this was the true appeal of the Southfork. For me, the recurring dream is to return to the Fall River backwater with enough daylight to work that monstrous pool with thoroughness and composure!

If you are interested in a September or October float for large browns which, according to locals, abandon all caution - or wish to try something new while in the "Fark" area, contact Southfork Expeditions, in Swan Valley, Idaho. These folks are anxious to promote the supreme summer fishing for cutthroats, but are really turned on to the fall brown trout run, and will work hard to put you into the "bucket"!
