Wildlife

This is serious wildlife country. Make sure you bring your camera and plenty of film. For serious wildlife photographers a 500mm lens with relatively fast film is advised for best results. A frame stabilizer is advised when camera is hand held. Both Brown and Black Bears are seen along the river. Beaver and beaver dams are everywhere and you'll see these little critters working every day. Porcupines are all over. You are very likely to see wolves. Moose use the river like a freeway and you'll see cows and calves often. Majestic Bald Eagles work the river and you'll see them every day. Their nests are like stick hotels. You will fish the river with other great anglers, the Osprey, whose power dives are incredible as well as the playful otter. You'll also see mink. In the late summer, Sand Hill cranes, geese and ducks are harbingers of fall. The caribou are moving.

Cost is \$2,995.00 for a one week stay.

ALASKA DREAM LODGE

"Promises much and fulfills it's promises!"

If you are considering an Alaskan adventure in 2000, Alaska Dream Lodge is possibly the best mixed bag fishery Alaska has to offer. Alaska Dream Lodge is located in a wonderfully remote section of South Western Alaska. Nestled amongst the Blue Spruce and Tammerac the lodge lies 132 miles upstream on the Aniak River at it's confluence with the mighty Kustiquin.

The native village of Aniak is serviced daily by both Penn Air and Frontier Airlines an hours flight from Anchorage. If you arrive during the salmon season you will see the Athabascan natives drying salmon in the traditional manner on racks along the Kustiquin. Some native art is available in the village. The boat ride to the lodge takes about an hour. It is an awesome trip. 32 miles of the most beautiful country in Alaska. It is difficult to make this trip without seeing a menagerie of wildlife. It is not uncommon for your guide to point out bear, moose, caribou, and Bald Eagle as you head upstream and begin your adventure.

Accommodations and Meals

The cabins are clean, comfortable, and are heated with wood stoves. Wood, kindling, and paper are always in place. There is one big cabin that accommodates 4 people, ideal for a group of friends. Two other cabins hold up to 3 people. Each cabin has a bathroom complete with hot shower. There are 3 double rooms in the lodge which share 2 bathrooms and 2 showers. The lodge gathering room is warm and comfy. Several big couches and easy chairs snuggle up to a big wood burning stove. A free-standing circular fireplace warms the fly tying area. There is a pool table, dart board, and game table along with the main dining area all in this one big room. It's a great spot to gather over cocktails after fishing and swap stories. All cabins and main lodge have river views. Hearty Alaskan home-cooked meals are prepared each day. There is always plenty of food for seconds for hungry anglers. Lunches are taken streamside. Barbecued salmon, an occasional treat prepared by the guides, provide a memorable lunch. The coffee pot is always on and available at 6:00 a.m.

Fishing the Aniak

The Aniak is a remote and pristine river. It is inaccessible to float planes. Aside from the occasional native, few anglers other than lodge guests are ever seen. The lodge fishes approximately 45 miles of the river as well as numerous tributaries. These tributaries can be awesome and stay clear even on the rare occasion when the main river is affected by weather. Salmon often stack up in these tributaries in unbelievable numbers. Anglers are moved around by jet boat. Most fishing is done by wading and, on occasion, from the boats. There are literally hundreds of pools that hold fish well. Beginning with a heavy King (Chinook) and Chum Salmon run in late June, the season gets off with a bang. This run can continue through early August. Chum Salmon often pile up in certain pools in great numbers where fishing can be wild. A big King Salmon can run 50 pounds or larger on the Aniak. The Silver (Coho) run from mid August through September. Anyone who has caught these acrobatic gamesters know what this fishing can be. Grayling are plentiful as are Dolly Varden. The Aniak is the home of the famous Leopard Rainbow Trout unrivaled for their sheer beauty. Bragging rights on this species start at 30" and above on the Aniak. 26" to 28" Rainbows are common. Numerous backwaters and marshy areas called "The Grassys" abound with large Northern Pike.

CASTING POND CLINIC

A new year is at hand and perhaps some new equipment is in hand so now is the chance to raise your casting skills another notch. The casting pond is at your disposal seven days a week, 24 hours a day, rain or shine. If, by chance, the rain is coming from thunderheads and has lightning flashing, do not use a graphite rod. They are an excellent conductor and may draw fire.

The clinics are for the benefit of all levels of casters. If you wish to improve your accuracy, the rings and coaches will be there. If you wish to learn or improve your distance casting, there will be help on hand. If you are just getting started, we will help you reach a level that will make you a capable fly fisher. Remember, except for rare instances, you are going to spend over 95% of your time casting. The other few percentage points will go to fighting some foolish fish that tried to run off with your fly. Being an accomplished caster can be a pleasant end in itself.

Come out and use your pond. It is one of the best in the country.

The clinics, as is usually the case, are at the mercy of the weather. If we are in the middle of a storm the event will be postponed until February.

The next scheduled clinic will be February 20, 2000.

am in my truck on a grand search for the great steelhead. The search, or hunt as I like to call it, starts early on Friday morning. The rain is coming down and things aren't looking good. I point my truck north and off I go. The first stop is a look at the confluence of the Russian River and Dry Creek. The creek looks really fishy but the main stem of the Russian is the color of chocolate milk. No fly fishing here and the rain is falling harder. My next stop is the 128 bridge at Geyserville. The river's rising and off color. The Russian is out for the day or week or month. I think about going home but I've taken the day off and I'm going to spend it fishing. I find myself and my truck on the back road to Stewarts Point. Forty four miles of up and down and around and around with more wind and rain. The upper Gualala looks good but as I hit the main stream at the town of Gualala and Highway one, it's a great disappointment. Too much wa-

ter and mud. Oh well, it's only 16 miles to the Garcia River. It's still raining. Past the cemetery, down the hill and around the corner, I am greeted by hundreds of Tundra Swans and another river that can't be fished on a fly. The first good news of the day, "It's Stopped Raining". Maybe, just maybe, Alder Creek is fishable. Five more miles north and by God the little creek at Alder is running strong but it's fishable. The rain is back. On with my gear - waders, shoes, rain jacket, vest, and my trusty 8 wt. Sage. I am ready to do battle. It's raining harder. I fish hard for about an hour with nothing moving, nothing rolling. I am cold and hungry. To the truck for some lunch and coffee. It's stopped raining and a ray of sun is coming through the clouds. As I am eating, I see my first fish of the day rolling in the slow water. The sun is out. I walk down, make two casts, and the slow water explodes. I am hooked up! A big hen fresh from

the ocean just 300 yards away makes one long run and two leaps and spits my fly back in my face. Four hours of driving, wet to the bone, a little over one hour of fishing, What A Day – What A Day.

On the club front, Carl Blackledge is offering to give free fly tying lessons to all interested club members. If you would like to take up tying or get some pointers, please sign up at the next meeting or call me at 575-5993. We can handle about six to eight people at a time.

Also, we are going to have a bass tournament in March or April. If you are interested, please call me or sign up.


CASTING PRACTICE AND INSTRUCTION

MONTANA'S FINEST – 5 RIVERS LODGE



Last July my husband and I had a fantastic trip to one of Montana's beautiful valleys, the Beaverhead. The beauty was only surpassed by the incredible fishing we encountered and the quality lodge where we hung our hats, 5 Rivers Lodge. I can't say enough good things about 5 Rivers; from it's fabulous food, to it's great service and beautiful rooms, every particular was perfect.

Each morning started with a wonderful buffet, augmented by a hot entrée from the kitchen. After breakfast each guest made up his own lunch from a huge assortment of items. I really liked this feature as it ensured lunches that I enjoyed. We met some really wonderful fellow guests when we gathered each evening for the cocktail hour and had ample time to hear the day's fishing tales. The diner that followed was gourmet and satisfied the heartiest appetite.

There is even a pond filled with large trout in the front yard allowing anyone a chance to practice their casting after dinner. There was a library for the guest's use, complete with television and VCR. It contained many books and videos pertaining to fishing. A hot tub was also available. Next year they will also have a tackle shop and a conference room as they were being built while we were there.

However the best feature was the wonderful fishing program. Each two guests were matched with one guide for their entire stay. Each morning the guides arrived with their drift boats and helped load lunches and gear. They told us what flies would be needed for the day and we picked up any we didn't have at the tackle shop. The flies changed from river to river and from day to day. The guides all keep in contact with each other and know what worked on various waters the day before so you are sure to have the flies that are working well and are fishing on waters that are the most productive.

You have several choices of rivers: Beaverhead, Jefferson, Ruby, Red Rock, and the Big Hole. But the Beaverhead River was my favorite. This river is so brushy that it would be almost impossible to fish it without a drift boat. We caught numerous beautiful brown trout in the 18"-22" range, many on dry flies. There are various places on the rivers where drift boats can be put in or taken out, and the guide chose the section or sections we drifted each day and arranged to have his vehicle moved to the take out area. One day we fished the morning on one section of the river and moved to a completely different section for the afternoon. The majority of the day is spent fishing from the boat, however stops are made several times a day to fish especially good water from the bank. Our guide told us the rivers are productive all season, no one time being "the best" that some times are better for dry flies and others are best for nymph fishing.

Although this is a fly fishing destination this lodge has guides that will teach you the art if you're not a flyfisherman. Two fathers and sons who had never fly fished were at our table for dinner. After their first day they were all excited about their day and were hooked on fly fishing for life. By the second day they were making plans to return again next year. They even talked about bringing their non-fishing wives as they felt they would really enjoy the accommodations and the area. There are many things for the non-fisherman to see and do. This lodge is very versatile, you may plan your own stay. It can be a single night with no fishing or as many nights and as many days of fishing as you'd like. You can also take a break from the fishing for a day or two and take in some sightseeing. The price will depend on the number of nights and days you choose.

I really had a great time and will be happy to answer any questions you may have about 5 Rivers Lodge.

Instead of just explaining **how** to do something, we also have to explain **why** we do something, and this often tests our own knowledge. Do we really know why? Or are we just hacking away with how?

This is why our club is such a great resource. We have members and guests that not only know why, but also continually push the envelope of how to do something. Our recent holiday dinner was a great example of this. Our special guest speaker, Mel Krieger was asked to do a casting demonstration inside the dining room. Now, I know that some people were hoping for an exclusive two handed spey casting lesson, or maybe a specialty cast of some sorts, but our guest Stephen was just happy to meet the guy. I think that everybody got something out of Mel's demonstration, even spey casters, but what I recall most is the advice he gave without demonstration. And it was this: "some casts don't work". It was refreshing to hear this statement from one who knows the how and why of casting. Especially when many of us want to add quantity to our repertoire of casts instead of quality. Keep your basic casts as your strong suit and develop alternative casting techniques from these basic principles. It was amazing how he wove his visual demonstration with his travels abroad. At the end I know many of us were mentally spey casting twenty feet of yarn to sea-run trout in Argentina.

Thanks to Scotty for providing such an interesting guest speaker, and for inviting Windsor High student Stephen Tonelli and his father to be guests at the dinner.

t took Saint Patty's Day to get me back on the Russian River. I took off early from work and fished my favorite spot, right below the 128 bridge in Geyserville. Lots of trash fish but no Steelhead. On Saturday Lee Smith, Bob Norman, and I fished above the 128 bridge in the morning and below it in the afternoon. We caught lots of fish. This got me to thinking about how grand the Russian River can be for people just starting to fly fish.

With the ability to cast a few yards, one can learn quite a bit about fishing in the upper reaches of the Russian River. Shad, hardheads, squaw fish, perch, smallmouth, carp, and steelhead of all sizes can be taken with a fly. I find if I use larger trout streamers and nymphs your success rate goes way up. Woolybuggers, brindlebug,

leech patterns can really hammer this fish.

In the spring there are thousands of smolt or young steelhead in the river. They can be a blast on a three weight or four weight rod. Small dry flies will take the smolt. I personally cut the point off my hooks so no damage is done to the fish. Just practicing casting to this fish and hooking them up for the moment can be great fun and a great lesson.

On the Club front, remember the Club's opener is the last weekend of the month. The trout opener is on Saturday, April 29, 2000. Most of us leave Thursday or Friday of that week. We set up camp at the P.G.&E. camp ground in Cassell, California.


I will supply maps at the next meeting, which is the 12th of



What's New at Fishing International

Christmas Island: Big Eddie and Joe's Christmas Island Bonefishing and Croquet Club. Top Christmas Island guide, Big Eddie, along with Idaho businessman, Joe Roop have built a new club. They built it from the ground up on the foundations of the old British officer's quarters. It's American run. All rooms have private baths and full time A/C. The bar overlooks the ocean and is great, as is the food. We've had reports from several who have been there. The new club is next door to the Captain Cook. They also have cornered all the best guides on the island, something that has angered some Captain Cook guests. Also, the lodge has flat skiffs, a first on the island, which can get anglers to places that are rarely fished.

Alaska: Tyonek Lodge: Our own Bob Norman is running this small, Alaska Lodge only 30 minutes from Anchorage. The river has a very good run of 20-40 lb. King salmon in June and a nice run of silvers through August. There are three cabins which can comfortably house 12 anglers. It's a small river easily walked and fished. 3 nights and 3 days fishing all inclusive of charter flight is \$1560.

Bahamas: Acklins Island Bonefish Camp: A lot of you have heard about this great bonefishery already with many already booked in for the upcoming season. There are miles of bonefish filled flats here. The lodge offers both guided and non-guided fishing and there are two man sea kayaks available to take non-guided anglers from flat to flat. The prices start for non-guided \$929 & half guided, half non-guided run \$1329 per week.

Ireland: Fishing and sightseeing tours. Beginning this summer, Fishing International will be running trout and salmon fishing tours of the Emerald Isle. What a wonderful place this is with, believe it or not, often excellent fishing and very reasonable.

Sonoma County: Spring Turkey Hunts: A friend of our is allowing turkey hunting on her ranch near Sebastopol for the first time ever. It is loaded with turkeys. The spring hunts are the best with the season extending through April. Guided hunts include breakfast and lunch run \$295 per hunter per day. This is a good one! Call Bob at Fishing International.

Baja Loreto: There are still some spaces left at Loreto in July. Most of you know how great this dorado fishing can be and how nice the Oasis Hotel is. The rate is \$1050 per week.

Habernathy: Habernathy Bonefish Club: One big room with tin roof. Large, comfortable 6 hole outhouse. Stand outside in the rain for a shower. Mostly beans for meals, 3 varieties. Lots of bonefish. Not too many snakes. Every shot available required before entering country. \$495 a week unguided.



Few works from your (Acting) President: **Paul Major**

Well, fellow RRFFers, I'm back as your President, this time not by popular demand, but rather from practical necessity.

The enormous sadness of president-elect Bob Neill's death on May 25th, was completely unexpected and threw the Executive Board somewhat into a state of disarray. Due to press of business Vice-President Lee Smith is unable to assume the Presidency at this time, and our superb previous President, Scotty Broome, had just completed two consecutive terms and was feeling, understandably, more than a bit burned out in the job and not prepared to take it on for a third term.

So...having had a two-year sabbatical from the Board of Directors, I volunteered to serve as acting President until our next election this coming spring.

Bob Neill is, and always will be, sorely missed. Not only by those of us who counted him as a dear friend, but

by every member of the wide fraternity of fly fishers in California. Bob was a charter member of the Russian River Fly Fishers and, from day one, worked tirelessly for the betterment of the club and the sport. He has been an active member of our Board of Directors as far back as anyone can remember and has been, for many years, our representative to the NCCFFF. The Executive Board had voted to award Bob the honor of Life Membership and this award was accepted by his wife, Jean, at the club picnic in June. No one could have deserved the honor more than Bob.

Perhaps we should have been more prepared for the possibility that Bob's battle with cancer could be one that he would lose, but the incredible courage and optimistic spirit that he brought to the fight was infectious and inspiring. He didn't believe he would lose, and neither did I.

I had the great privilege to have shared several fishing trips with Bob

during the final months of his life. In October he and I took my trailer to the Shirley Creek campground on the North Umpqua for a week, joined by Joe Craig, Lee Smith, and Wayne Kipp. Wayne was the only one of us to catch a steelhead, but it was Bob's first trip to this incomparable stream. and his delight in it's beauty and our days casting it's waters together are memories that will stay with me always. We also spent two days drifting the Lower Sacramento, which was another first for Bob. It was one of those trips where we were absolutely hammering the fish and Bob was ecstatic: he told me (several times) that it was the best fishing he'd ever had...and I was lucky enough to be there.

I had not been Bob Neill's friend as long as many of you have been, but he was as good a man as I have ever know, as good a friend as I will ever have, and I will miss him greatly for the rest of my life.



Al Kyte - Fly Fisher

Al Kyte, our speaker in September, is among the most respected fly fishing and fly casting teachers in the country. His highly regarded instructional book, Fly Fishing – Simple to Sophisti-



cated, and his research study on the Biomechanics of Distance Fly Casting constitute major contributions to the sport and have resulted in his selection to the Federation of Fly Fisher's first national Board of Governors to Certify Fly Casting Instructors. Two of his recent articles, "Rod handling" and "Going for Distance—Biomechanics Help to Explain It" are among the few selected from Fly Fisherman for translation into fly fishing publications in Asia and Europe.


Al started fishing a dry fly in 1945 and had nymph fished with Charlie of Brooks, Ted Fay, and E.H. "Polly" Rosborough, by the late 1960s. A long-term of faculty member at the University of California at Berkeley, Dr. Kyte brought his of teaching and coaching background to the instruction of fly fishing in the early of 1970s. He developed his own fly fishing schools through the University of California Extension, taught in the early Fenwick schools, and was a licensed guide of on the Upper Sacramento River. Described as an "enthusiastic and articulate" of teacher, Al has been presenting programs throughout the West and into Alaska of for more than 25 years. He has produced many dedicated fly fishers, several of tournament casters and fishing guides, a famous rod builder, and an editor and of publisher of a fly fishing magazine.

In 1995, Al was honored as the only Pacific Coast angler to be selected to the Orvis Fresh Water Advisory Team.





MINNIE LEECH

This first fly is a Minnie Leech. Steelhead season will be up on us and this is a good fly. To fish it: If the river is swift and shallow, 4 feet in depth or less, the classic quartering down-stream cast and tight line is optimal. If the water is deep and slow, you need to impart a lot of motion to the fly. Twitch it "not strip" - vigorously, short 5 - 10 inch hops. Generally, the fish will pick it up when it drops.

- ♦ HOOK: Heavy Wire, sizes 1 1/0, tmc 7999 or Mustad 34011.
- THREAD: Red 3/0 Kevlar.
 - ◆ BODY: Straight cut bunny strip and plenty of flashabou.
 - COLORS: Purple, black, pink and two tone colors; pink tail and purple collar.
 - WEIGHT: Either; lead wrap or barbell eyes.
 - HEAD: Crystal chenille.

Start by tying the bunny strip at the bend of the hook, leave a tail about 1 - 1/2 inches length of the shank and before you continue to wrap the bunny strip add ten strands of flashabou, extending 1/4 inch past the end of bunny hair and wrap the thread up to the eye. Continue to wrap the bunny strip tightly up the shank stopping 1/4 inch from the eye of the hook and tie off. Tie in 15 strands of flashabou along each side. Tie down barbell eyes just behind hook eye and cross wrap over them with the chenille. Tie off and apply head cement.



Winter Stores....

I had walked by them for a few weeks now, their spot on a little used portion of the kitchen counter just enough out of the way to keep them from being a nuisance. Each time I would see them the voice in my head would sound off, "I really should take care of those..." but that voice would be quelled instantly as other thoughts, memories, took it's place. In my house, there really is no place that is "out of the way". I guess it really boils down to what I'm willing to put up with. A student of procrastination, if I don't have to move something to do something else, things tend to stay in whatever spot they've staked claim to. But there are other reasons, I've found, that some things just never do seem to get put away...

One afternoon last week, while actually waiting for water to boil, I picked up the Reddington, and tried once again to remove the spool. It was the newest of the three reels that had rested on my counter since the second week of August. As before, the spool was frozen solid. Of course this was one of the reasons that all three reels hadn't been taken care of earlier, a plausible excuse that had enabled me to shelve the chore for nearly two months. I pulled again....and again....entertaining little hope that the results would be any different than the previous dozen times I'd tried. And, with the absence of hope, I found the spool in one hand and the reel body in the other.

"Well there went my excuse..." I muttered. I inspected the inner workings of the reel, noting a little corrosion and confirming my suspicions that even my diligent soaking and rinsing hadn't kept the saltwater from doing damage. I put both sections back on the counter and went back to my lunch.

Which brings me to last Friday evening...The extra piece, now that the Reddington had been separated, had made the little pile somewhat bigger and a little less easy to ignore. I picked up the reel body and a rag and began cleaning...

...I remembered the dorado. I had bought the reel only a week before my trip to Loreto with Binky Castleberry. Purchased as a back up, I had been looking for something inexpensive that would suffice in the event of disaster with one of my primary reels, a Billy Pate Tarpon and a Lamson Permit. The Reddington had fit the bill at under \$150.00 and with a guarantee that, if anything went wrong with it, it would be replaced free of charge. Once in Loreto, I had decided to give it a workout-and the best dorado fishing I had ever experienced helped me put it to the test.

The dorado were incredible...20 to 35 pound fish that repeatedly tore line from the Reddington with every hook-up. One fish followed another, at times only a minute apart, and for each 15 to 40 minute fight, the reel sang. Images of feeding dorado, slashing the surface, competing with one another for the *sardinias* and my popper imitation, fueled me as I continued cleaning... I remembered the bait ball; sardines packed so tight that they were literally spilling over themselves above the ocean surface in their frantic efforts to escape the feeding frenzy beneath. And our guide, casually dipping his bait net into the ball, scooping sardines into our live well only moments before the first dorado crashed through them followed by a dozen others. We stood spellbound at the carnage, our attentions divided by the feeding frenzy below us and the leaping fish on the ends of our fly lines.

The reel cleaned up well, although some corrosion still remained. I lubed it and returned it to it's case. Picking up the Billy Pate, I went in search of the wrench to remove it's spool, a handy too, as long as you remember where you put it after the last time you cleaned it, a challenge when cleaning on a "once a year" basis. Finding the tool, I went to work on the Pate...and remembered the sailfish...

...A bill appearing...slashing the surface...batting the fly as it skips behind the boat. The initial tug causing us all to stand and watch the action. Teasing the fly up...letting it fall back... watching the sailfish pursue...sail and bill slicing the surface...striking the fly...finally the fish turning, as I let the fly fall back, and charging the fly sideways. The grab...the strike...the ocean exploding as the fish feels the resistance of the fly line, the tandem hooks sinking into it's bill. Tail walking...leaps...the reel screaming...my heart in my throat. And then the battle, 30-40 minutes of gaining line, inches at a time, only to lose it again with more explosive jumping...finally bringing the fish to boat for a quick picture and the release. Two times, two beautiful fish landed and released. And then the others, the near misses, the lost fly lines as the backing exploded while setting the hook, the ones that "came unbuttoned". Wonderful memories relived again on a chilly night in mid October.

I lubed the Billy Pate and returned it to it's case, a wonderful reel and my favorite. Alone on the counter, the Lamson waited...

...a reel that saw only one day of fishing this summer, teamed with my custom Sage 10-weight which proved to be no match for the size of the fish this time around. More dorado... turning the light tackle inside-out for battles ranging 30-45 minutes...and a foul-hooked sail who, while casting to it with a popper, had risen up over my fly line and drug it down beneath him, the popper following and eventually lodging itself in his side. With no leverage, we followed the fish for about 40 minutes while I tried to retrieve my fly line. Eventually we gave up and cut the amnesia, never having even the slightest ability to stop or turn the fish without the leverage of hooking him in the bill or mouth. And more memories...previous trips...other sail-fish...other dorado...all dancing across the surface of the Sea of Cortez.

Finishing the Lamson, I returned it to it's case. The counter was clear. The reels were now back in storage. I looked at the space somewhat regretfully – realizing that each time I had passed this counter for the past two months, the memories had been there for me as well. It was those memories that had quelled the urge to "take care of those..." and they had come to life each time I saw those reels on that section of counter. It is also those memories that return to life each time I view the photograph on my computer screen desktop, Enrique and I supporting a beautiful 80-pound sailfish in a sun-splashed ponga on the Sea of Cortez. CALF TAIL CLOUSER

This month's fly is the Calf Tail Clouser, originated by Bob Clouser, really a Clouser Minnow. This variation is unique because of it's size and tied in #8, #10, and #12 freshwater hooks for panfish. If you try to tie this pattern with conventional materials it will make the fly too bulky, so it needs to be tied with calf tail, it has finer hair. Calf tail comes in a variety of colors. When you purchase calf tail get an extra white one because the underside of most patterns call for white bellies. This pattern can be used for trout also, just leave the head black. Combinations of tan/white, yellow/white, black/olive, and yellow/red are the most frequently used. There are a few tying tips you should be aware of. 1. Keep the patterns sparse, you can always add material. 2. Use mono thread, found in Ben Franklin's sewing department. It allows the material to show through. 3. Since the flies are small, tie in two strands of Krystal Flash for each fly. Lay it on top of the shank of the hook, extending about half the length of the shank beyond the bend of the hook, with the other part extending out over the eye of the hook. Once the flash is secured, fold back over itself and secure about midway on the shank of the hook. Because of it's small size, bead chain may replace standard lead eyes depending on the depth and sink rate you desire. MATERIALS NEEDED

HOOK: #4-#12 freshwater or salt water hook.

THREAD: Clear mono, flat waxed red on head, black on head of trout pattern. Bead chain medium or small . . . Small or extra small dumbbell eyes. EYES:

Rainbow colored Krystal Flash. ACCENTS:

OVER WING: Color – optional. **UNDER WING:** Color – optional.

Step #1

Start the thread on the hook, bring it to the midpoint of the shank.

Step #2

Attach 2 strands of Krystal Flash about 1 3/4 inches long, extending half of a shank past the bend of the hook and the remaining flash extending out over the eye of the hook, bring that back and fold that over onto itself and tie down. This gives the flash a varied length and allows some shorter pieces in the fly.

Step #3

Secure the eyes about 1/4 to 1/3 down the shank from the eye of the hook.

Step #4

Attach the calf tail about 1/16 inch behind the eye, letting it lie between the eyes and tie off with one or two wraps behind the eyes.

Step #5

Rotate the fly over or remove from the vise so that the bend of the hook is on the bottom. Tie in the color of your choice and again put one or two wraps behind the eyes. Whip finish the head. Cover the head with red or black thread to finish off the fly and apply head cement. One other tip: The deeper you fish, the darker the fly.
