Napa River Striper Fishing By Joerg Olson

As an eight-year-old kid, sitting on a rip-rap levy in the delta, a spinning rod in hand, soaking a lead sinker and 2 hooks with chunks of anchovy, I caught my first striper. It was an eighteen incher that pulled the line off the reel, and I was sure I would lose it.

It was one of several warm-fuzzy memories that came to mind while I was watching Captain Patrick Mackenzie's presentation at last September's RRFF General Meeting. If you haven't seen his presentation on striper fishing in the local tidal estuaries of the SF Bay, and you are interested in striper fishing, be sure to catch it. Or go fishing with him, as Rick Baker and I did on December 4th.

We left Santa Rosa at 5:45 am to meet Capt. Mackenzie at Cuttings Wharf on the Napa River. The patchy fog soup closed in on us as we drove through Sonoma, but lifted once we started climbing out of Sonoma Valley on Hwy 121 and headed into Napa County. We pulled into the parking lot at the wharf in the gray morning light 10 minutes or so before our appointed 7:00 am meet time.

Captain Mackenzie stood in his 18 ft. Montauk Boston Whaler at the dock, engine idling, talking to another fisherman pulling out from the dock. This was an all-inclusive guided half-day trip ending at 11:30 am. We didn't bring flies, leaders, tippet, reels, rods, food, water, life vests, or any other gear. The instructions were to bring warm clothing you could layer off and on, sunglasses, and don't forget your valid California Fishing License.

Rick and I hurried over to the boat, introduced ourselves, sharing that we had seen his striper presentation at the recent RRFF meeting, jumped in the boat and immediately left the dock. We headed out into the cold mist and lifting fog.

Five minutes into the boat ride, Patrick shut off the skiff's motor, put down the electric trolling motor and gave us each an 8-wt. rod with intermediate sinking lines. He told us where and how far to cast. He told us what speed to strip the line, and how to vary our stripping, and when in that presentation we could expect a grab—on the drop. As it had been a long time since I had cast for stripers. I was more than happy to receive his detailed instruction.

The Boston Whaler was stable and had a good platform to cast from. With 2 righty's, one caster in the front and the other in the back, depending upon which side of the boat we were casting from, one caster had to be careful not to hook the guide standing in the middle as the fly would be going over the interior of the boat. Rick was proficient at throwing his back cast and turning to fish the retrieve, keeping his fly on the outside of the boat. I couldn't consistently cast that nice of a cast, but fortunately, I avoided hitting the captain with the size 4, big, bushy, dumbbell-eyes ladened fly. It would have been more than painful to get hit with that size fly hook. Capt. Mackenzie shared; he was well practiced at ducking.

I asked Capt. Mackenzie if the fly we were using had a name. He said it was his version of the "Black Phantom," a fly created by the local legend and renaissance man, Russell Chatham. If there is a fly

with a cooler name than that, I can't think of it. Mackenzie's version has terrific movement in the water with an undulating flash and accents of deep purple and green that made it look enticing.

For me, the first 30 minutes of fishing are always the most anxious and intense. After about 20 minutes I can't help but start wondering. Why I haven't hooked a single fish? What am I doing wrong? Are the fish present today? Is it going to be one of those tough days? I must remind myself to relax.

On this morning none of those thoughts occurred to me, as within the first 10 minutes, Rick's rod was thumping downward, and a 22" striper came to the boat and was released. And several minutes later we had both hooked up. We both were all smiles and feeling so goooood!

As the morning progressed, the fog slowly burned off and the sun came out. The fishing slowed. Captain Mackenzie switched out our gear accordingly. At 11:30 am, my last cast of our trip, I hooked a strong 5-6 lb. striper.

Steelhead in the Classroom By Karl Joost

Many thanks to Jeff Cratty, Mike Borba and Gregg Wrisley who organized tank assembly materials with David Berman and me at Sonoma Water Education Center recently!

This year about 25 new teachers will receive complete 10-gallon tanks with power filters, chillers and all the gear needed to hatch and raise steelhead in their classrooms in Sonoma County. Each complete assembly is valued at about \$350. This is a big deal.

A big, big thank you to RRFF and RETU, Sonoma Water and CDFW for their continuing support of this handson and educational science program!

David Berman (Sonoma Water senior program specialist) reports that this year 70 plus local classrooms are continuing. With 25 new teachers, making almost 100 participants, it is a record number!

RRFF Casting Pond History By Mike Spurlock

2024 Casting Pond Plans

The Casting Pond is a very important part of the Russian River Fly Fishers club. It took a few years for the idea to be solidify and the pond to be built. Without it, what would we be?

Back in 1976, the club had an idea formed in discussion around Norm Sutcliff's sporting goods

store in downtown Santa Rosa. By July 1977 was the first edition of The Cast newsletter was born. Then on March 23, 1982, the Santa Rosa City Council had a meeting whereby the casting pond concept was approved.

The minutes of the SRC Council Meeting read in the following way: "Recreation and Parks Director Hoefer reviewed receipt of the proposal from the Russian River Fly Fishers, Inc. to construct and operate fly cast pools for the Santa Rosa area. Following meetings and staff research, it appeared membership would undertake to raise funds for the project which would include landscaping, and a club house; the first phase would be one pool. During Council comment, Mr. Hoefer indicated ownership of the facilities would remain with the City; it would be built and dedicated to the City; and the organization would have first use of the facility when it was not being used for City recreation purposes.

Liz Wray, president of the Russian River Fly Fishers, reported that most of the 140-150 members were residents of Santa Rosa. Mrs. Wray also explained how the facility would be used for educational purposes.

At the conclusion of discussion, Councilman Healy moved to authorize staff to prepare an agreement per the proposal. The motion was seconded by Council Jeffries and carried. AYES (5).

In the ensuing 4 years, the club raised \$70,000 and built a pond which was dedicated May 18, 1986. The city owns the property, and the club maintains the pond. See the memorial on the southwest corner of the pond.

This is the only casting pond north of San Francisco and one of only 4 in the state. From the start, the club has been dedicated to teaching fly casting to the public for free. On the new member application, the most common reason for joining is "to improve my cast".

By 2008, after 22 years, the first liner was replaced at a cost of \$12,000.

Now, with another 20 years approaching in 2028, we are wondering how long it might be to replace the liner. We think that the liner may still be in fairly good shape, but we do need to inspect it, make an estimate of remaining life, and then make sure we have adequate funds when it does need replacement."

Our short-term plan right now:

- Take care of some relatively minor concrete repairs.
- In May when we drain and clean the pond, assess the life of the liner from which we hope to have a target date for the next liner replacement.
