## President's Message

### Perspective...

My family and I recently had the opportunity to do some travel by rail in Switzerland. As we rode from one city to another, we saw the beautiful Alps, terraced vineyards and peaceful herds of dairy cattle. Of course, being a fly fisher, my eyes were always searching for bodies of water with anglers on them. Switzerland has many large lakes and rivers, all flowing with crystal-clear water, but only once in our travels did I see anyone fishing. While crossing a footbridge in a Swiss town, I did manage to spot a trout in the river below, so it's not like the country is totally devoid of finned opportunity. The lack of angling activity in that scenic land left me puzzled.

I never had a chance to ask the locals why their waterways were so devoid of anglers, but my guess is that private land ownership probably prevents the average person from having access to fishable water.

Here in the US we have national, state and local public lands that allow all citizens to fish, but in the rest of the world these rights can be few and far between. This should remind us how important it is for all of the sporting community to protect our public access and conserve natural resources.

The strength of fishing as a recreational activity in the US, compared to Europe, may also be cultural. Americans are long past the days when fishing was a necessity to keep the family fed, but we still take the time and effort to teach our children the sport and the appreciation for nature that it promotes. I hope that we as fly fishermen and women remember that there is value in passing our knowledge and skills on to future generations.

Sometimes it takes a bit of travel to appreciate how blessed we are to live where we do.

Heenan Lake is located on Hwy 89 at 7,200 feet, on the way to Monitor Pass. It is one of only a few native watersheds for the Lahontan Cutthroat Trout in California, and trout caught here qualify for the Heritage Trout Challenge. Special fishing regulations allow fishing in Heenan Lake starting Labor Day weekend and ending on the last Sunday in October. The lake is open to fishing on Friday through Sunday only, sunrise to sunset.

***"MASTERING THE DRY FLY"***

For September's meeting we welcome master guide **Jon Baiocchi** of *Baiocchi's Troutfitters*. Jon has been fly fishing and tying flies since 1972. He is a California licensed fly fishing guide, published author, educator, innovative fly-tier, and an award-winning public speaker who gives fly fishing presentations to clubs and expos across the state of California, and Nevada. Jon serves on the Truckee Trout Unlimited Board of Directors, and volunteers



his time with the South Yuba River Citizens League. Born in San Jose, CA in 1965, his Dad moved the entire family to Paradise, Ca in 1967 to be closer to prime fly fishing venues, and to raise his family in the spectacular forests of Northern California. Jon's Dad, Bob Baiocchi, was inducted into the Federation of Fly Fishers Hall of Fame in 1999 for his peerless conservation work, and was a major influence in helping Jon hone his fly fishing skills at a very young age. After finishing high school, Jon opted out of college to pursue a career as a professional snowboarder, competing at a national level, starring in feature movies, and working with manufacturers in their research and development programs. After his career ended in 1993, Jon focused entirely on fly fishing and conservation, learning even more of the intricate details of his home waters.

Jon now owns and operates **Baiocchi's Troutfitters** guide service In Northern California where he has been guiding for the last 20 years. He has a reputation as a very hard working guide that's been trained by some of fly fishing's best known anglers and guides, both past and present. His enthusiasm for the sport is contagious, and combined with his simple approach to teaching gives students the skills needed to be successful on all types of water. Moved by all things flora and fauna, his passion for such is never ending. Sharing his knowledge with others is of the greatest importance to him now, and to see others progress and reach the next level in fly fishing fulfills his life. It is the legacy his father left him, and a cherished tradition that Jon will continue in his honor. His locations for guiding include Lake Davis, the Wild & Scenic Middle Fork Feather River, Frenchman's Reservoir, the North Fork Yuba River, the Big & Little Truckee Rivers, the Lower Yuba River, and many secluded creeks in Eastern Plumas County. Jon's philosophy on fly fishing is to keep it simple, be confident in your presentation, and have fun!

Jon has an all new PowerPoint program that was especially created for numerous fly clubs looking for a more technical program on fishing the dry fly. **"Mastering the Dry Fly"** entails a brief history of the dry fly and those anglers who were involved from the beginning, simple to complex presentations, understanding rise forms, approaching water structure, tips & tricks, and Jon's favorite patterns for eager to educated trout. Beautiful images and new detailed animated slides provide the audience with clear and concise information for future

endeavors on the water while dry fly fishing. This will be a program you do not want to miss!

Even though the catch numbers were much lower than previous years, Walt did catch the biggest trout of the trip 23 inches. With the trout being scarce, Jeff Cratty knew there was other fish to be had, so he switched over to targeting largemouth bass and was successful in catching four large bass using his own tied bugger flies casting along the willow and shrub islands.

By Friday afternoon after very few trout strikes, Walt and Don decided to investigate Frenchman Lake and returned with favorable news of numerous strikes and fish caught during the few hours they fished. So, Saturday morning a decision was made to fish Frenchman Lake which was a first for most of us. The adventure was successful for most, with Chris getting skunked and Don catching his only two trout, 16 and 20 inches, on his way out of Frenchman at Little Last Chance Creek.

### ***Crane Prairie Reservoir - Central Oregon***

Located approximately 42 miles southwest of Bend, OR, Crane Prairie Reservoir is a legendary big trout lake where, on any given day, you may hook the biggest trout of your life! A "Cranebow" of 19 lbs. was recorded, and trout over 10 lbs. are regularly caught.

The lake has an average depth of 15 feet, and can get quite warm during the summer months. Fed by numerous cold water streams and rivers, including the Deschutes River, these cold channels provide the summer habitat for big trout while the warmer waters provide angling for big largemouth bass. You may also pick up a Kokanee or Tui Chub during the course of your day.

To fish Crane Prairie successfully, a watercraft (float tube, pontoon boat, kayak, canoe, pram or small boat) is essential. Fly selection is also crucial...so talk with the local fly shops to determine what insects the fish are feeding on at the particular time you are there. Leaders will be 2X and 3X...heavy...for big trout!

This is an amazing, and beautiful, fishery and well-worth your visit when in Central Oregon!
