PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

What's going on in September?

Here is an update on Russian River Fly Fishers activities:

General Meetings – September is usually the month when the RRFF gets back into action after a summer lull by beginning our monthly meetings, and on September 8 we met in-person at Santa Rosa Veteran's Memorial Hall for the first time since March of 2020. We did it in "hybrid" style by having members present there (wearing masks) and others attending remotely using the Zoom video app. Charlie Schneider, our Conservation Chair, gathered a panel

of Trout Unlimited and Cal Trout experts to talk about the current drought and how it is affecting trout and salmon in Northern California. We plan to continue this method for General Meetings in the next months and hope that more members can attend in-person as the COVID situation comes under control.

Casting Program – The casting pond at Galvin Park is OPEN and we are continuing to have casting clinics on Thursday evenings, 4:30PM to dusk. The pond is in great condition since it was drained and cleaned this summer and our casting instructors will be there to help both beginners and advanced casters improve their techniques. Remember that the clinics are open to the public, so invite your friends who may be interested in trying the sport.

Club Outings – Due to the closure of National Parks and Forests by wildfires, the September Manzanita Lake outing was cancelled. However, outings are planned at Lewiston Reservoir in October and Pyramid Lake in November. See the calendar on our website for details and to add your name to the sign up lists.

Membership and Dues – Our club roster now includes over 200 members. If you did not pay your club dues in 2020, you should have been invoiced in June for the 2021/22 year. For those of you who already paid, our thanks. For those of you who have yet to “get around to it”, you will find that it’s easy to pay on our club website, www.rrflyfisher.org Note that after September 30, we will be removing non-paid members from the club roster.

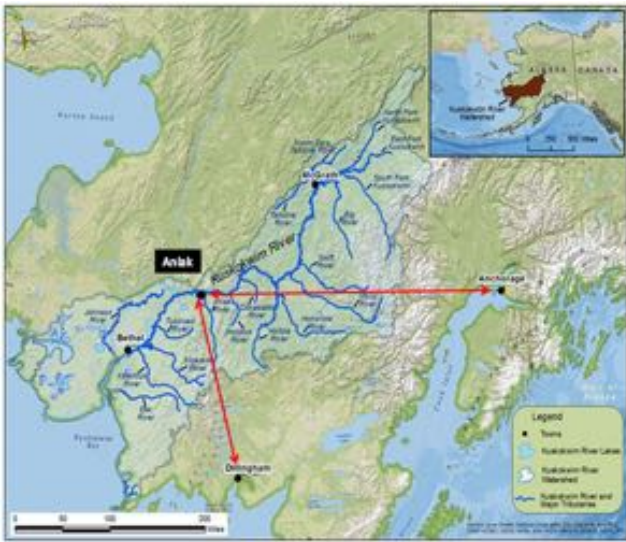
BACK TO THE ANIAK

Recent Alaskan Fishing Trip

In 2009, I first fished the Aniak River in Western Alaska. At the time, I stayed at the Aniak River Lodge, a tent camp, and the only lodge on the river. It was located approximately 40 miles upstream of the village of Aniak, population 500, where the Aniak River joins the Kuskokwim, a major drainage. A few years later, that lodge was abandoned when the river changed course leaving it high and dry. It was rebuilt with cabins at a new location a few miles away.

In June 2020, before the season could open, that lodge burned down. In 2021, it was rebuilt and reopened in June with 7 spacious 2-person weatherproof tents with propane heaters, hot water showers and flush toilets. Given the remote location and complex logistics, this was quite an accomplishment.



have sheefish, but none were caught in our week. I had caught one in 2009 (photo below).



In early 2021, my fishing buddies were looking for a venue, having put money down previously on a different trip that was cancelled due to Covid. We decided Alaska would be a safe bet and settled on fishing the Aniak River the last week of August. My son-in-law Jason and 11-year-old grandson Wyatt live in Dillingham, Alaska and wanted to learn to fly fish. With a tent/guide slot still open, I signed them up. That is what a grandpa is for.

Sockeye were spawning and were the main source of food for the rainbows, *dollies*, and grayling. Rainbows averaged about 20 inches (some were up to 27 inches) and were mostly taken on beads and flesh flies using 6 weight rods with floating lines. Also, when the sun came out, we did some top water mousing which produced a few bows and grayling. For silvers, we used pink streamers on 8 weights with floating lines.



Wyatt picked it up quickly and caught a lot of fish each day. He is hooked on fly fishing now. Wyatt landed a 'Leopard' Rainbow. That unique trout can be found only in a few Alaskan rivers, the Aniak being one of them.

My buddies and I flew to Anchorage, spent the night, and flew to Aniak the next day. Later that day, Jason and Wyatt flew into Aniak on a Cessna float plane and landed on the river. We met our guides, changed into waders, rigged up our rods and headed to the lodge in 7 skiffs, fishing along the way.



Each day, we rotated guides and had different river beats where the target species varied somewhat. Fishing was good. We caught rainbows, silver salmon, Dolly Vardens, grayling, and pike. The Aniak is one of the few rivers that

One evening, Wyatt got a quick lesson in tying flies and from that time on, he wanted to tie each evening immediately after getting off the water. From that point on, he also insisted on fishing with his own flies. The photo above is Wyatt holding the Coho he caught on the Aniak River using his own fly.

We fished mostly from the boat but did some walk and wade. We did not see any bears but there were lots of tracks around so the guides each carried a gun.



After the last day, we had an early morning wet and cold one-hour boat ride back to Aniak. I went on to Dillingham with Jason and Wyatt to spend a few days visiting the rest of the family. As we flew to Dillingham in a Cessna float plane, we flew over the Wood Tikchik State Park (largest state park in the US). When we spotted moose, bear or caribou, the pilot would sometimes circle around for a better view.



All in all, facilities were comfortable, food was very good, guides were great, and it was a very enjoyable adventure. Fishing was like my prior trip 12 years ago. It was particularly fun to see my grandson get hooked on fly fishing.

In retrospect, this was a somewhat risky trip with the Covid Delta variant spike that has recently taken over. Had I known that would happen, I probably would have backed out before we made our commitment in April. The commercial flights to and from Aniak were all fully masked. The lodge had no such restrictions, and we had no idea whether clients or staff were all vaccinated. However, to my knowledge, no one has had any Covid problems.

STEELHEAD IN THE CLASSROOM

RRFF COACHES NEEDED FOR 2022

Just a few words and photos tell the story—how important is it for kids to learn and experience real science—not just from books, but right there, in their classroom observing their tanks as the steelhead eggs hatch and develop into fry, and eventually they will thrive in a creek or stream. And then out in the field the children will see, touch, and smell the life of steelhead, experience the creeks, enjoy the fragrance of an alder canopy, while exploring the life cycle of fish, so, they can talk about the important things going on in these environments and yours back in the classroom.



This year, and for the past six years, here's how you can help—we'll ask for coaches to support classroom teachers and students in the following ways:

1. Help teachers master their hatching tank set up, answer questions, and assist when and where needed.

2. Deliver eggs to schools on Wednesday, **March 16th** and Wednesday, **April 13th**.
3. Listen to children share their enthusiasm and knowledge about the fish hatching in their classroom tank and share your enthusiasm with them.
4. Help the kids have a successful day when it's time to release the fry by getting fish into transport buckets and to a stream.



As coaches, we'll strictly follow the rules regarding masks, vaccination certificates, social distancing, and interactions. These rules will change as we go into the new year and we will do everything required for the safety of the kids, teachers, parents, and coaches.

Craig R. Johnston

November 15, 1942 - September 10, 2021

Member of The Russian River Fly Fishers and one of the Founders of the RRFF Casting Pond.

Craig Johnston passed away peacefully on September 10th, 2021 surrounded by his loving wife, Cheryl, of 58 years and their two daughters Tracy and Susie.

Craig was 78 years old. Born November 15, 1942 in Kenosha, Wisconsin to Dr. Russell and Virginia Johnston. He had one brother, Perry Johnston. His six grandchildren (Alec, Kennedy, Chandler, Luke, Campbell, and Stella) called him "Baba" and cherished the wisdom he shared about life, travel, education, hunting, fishing and of course the need to learn to play golf. Craig moved to Santa Rosa in 1945, where he continued to live for the rest of his life.

Craig played on the golf team and was a member of the Beta Fraternity at the University of Oregon (1960-1964) and then attended UC Hastings College of the Law in San Francisco (1964-1967). He practiced Estate Planning in Santa Rosa for 40+ years.

Craig served as President of the Sonoma County Bar Association, President of the Santa Rosa Active 20-30 Club, Member of The Russian River Fly Fishing Club and one of the Founders of the RRFF Casting Pond. He and Cheryl belonged to Santa Rosa Golf & Country Club for 56 years, where Craig won the Club Championship.

In his later years, he would say "I have lived life to the fullest and have no regrets" and advised his family to do the same.
